
RESOURCES AT THE CENTRE

DOG WALKERS PLEASE BE AWARE!

COMMUNITY BAITING PROGRAMS WILL SOON BE UNDERWAY IN THIS AREA!

Private Landholders across Far East Gippsland will soon be burying baits ON THEIR OWN PROPERTIES from the 16th of April. The Community Baiting Programs will conclude on the 19th of June.

Private Landholders involved in the Community Baiting Programs are working in association with the Department of Sustainability & Environment, Parks Victoria and the Department of Primary Industries in the ongoing control of Red Foxes and Wild Dogs.

Foxes and Wild Dogs pose a threat to domestic stock and wildlife, and they spread weeds and disease. Private Landholders involved in the Community Baiting Programs are demonstrating that they are serious about being part of the efforts to control these pests across the landscape.

DURING THE BAITING PROGRAM IT IS IMPORTANT THAT DOG OWNERS:

- DO NOT ALLOW THEIR DOGS TO ROAM AWAY FROM HOME;
- TAKE PARTICULAR CARE IF WALKING A DOG CLOSE TO A PROPERTY INVOLVED IN A BAITING PROGRAM;
- PREVENT THEIR DOG FROM CONSUMING FOOD ITEMS THEY ENCOUNTER WHILE BEING WALKED, EITHER BY USING A MUZZLE OR SECURING THE DOG TO A LEASH.

Landholders involved in the baiting program MUST:

- Advise their <u>immediate</u> neighbours in writing that they are going to be involved in the baiting program;
- · Erect warning signs at all entry points to their properties prior to the commencement of baiting;
- · Correctly fill in the warning signs, indicating the START date and the FINISH date of the program;
- Dispose of all baits not eaten by wild dogs or foxes by incineration or deep burial;
- Collect all baits at the conclusion of the program for proper disposal;
- Remove all warning signs FOUR WEEKS AFTER the conclusion of the baiting program.



1 Egg
3 Potatoes, cut into chunks
Shredded cheddar cheese
1 Onion
Flour
Salt and Pepper
Margarine
Oil

Method

Boil the potatoes until soft (about 25 minutes) drain the water, and leave to stand until cool. Chop the onion into small pieces and set aside.

When the potatoes have cooled, mash them and add the egg and mix thoroughly. Add the onion and a handful of shredded cheese into the egg and potato. Take a large spoonful of the potato mixture and roll into a ball. Flatten the ball until it resembles a pancake. Fry the potato cakes until they are light brown on each side. Drain excess oil by placing on paper towels to cool.
